She will continue to focus on her field of work «International Coordination of Nutrition» at the Section.

Country report from Norway

Following Karin Mecozzi's report from Italy, here comes the account of the only Norwegian Demeter herb grower Ola Aukrust, who also belongs to the steering group:

«We are in the Norwegian mountains. Our village Lom is located at 500 meters above sea level, the mountain directly behind the farm rises up to 2068 meters. With a rainfall of 350 millimetres per year, we are the driest place in Northern Europe. The prerequisite for farming at all is artificial irrigation.

Great interest in herbs and medicinal plants led to the creation of a show garden in the 1980s. This was followed by a 20-year collaboration with a Norwegian organic herbal cooperative. After an enthusiastic start, however, it turned out that the distribution was not as easy to do as you first thought. Since the turn of the millennium, we have been building our own brand, as is widely used in the wine industry. In this way, better sales opportunities can be created in the long term.

Our «Seter-Te» (alp tea) is served in the only Norwegian 3-star restaurant Maaemo in Oslo. All ingredients come from wild collection: birch leaves, epilobium flowers and leaves, dried blueberries, roots, leaves and seeds of the Norwegian angelica and red clover flowers. The Norwegian angelica is a traditional medicinal plant in Norway. Here, it grows wild up to 1500 meters between the highest mountains; already in the Viking Age it was considered an important crop.



For seven years the herbs have been our livelihood. We are a big family with five children, two to four interns and two employees. The goal for the coming years is the further development of our gardens in conjunction with our new cultural center. Come to visit us ! Contact: <u>aukr@online.no</u>, <u>www.aukrust-nordgard.no</u>
